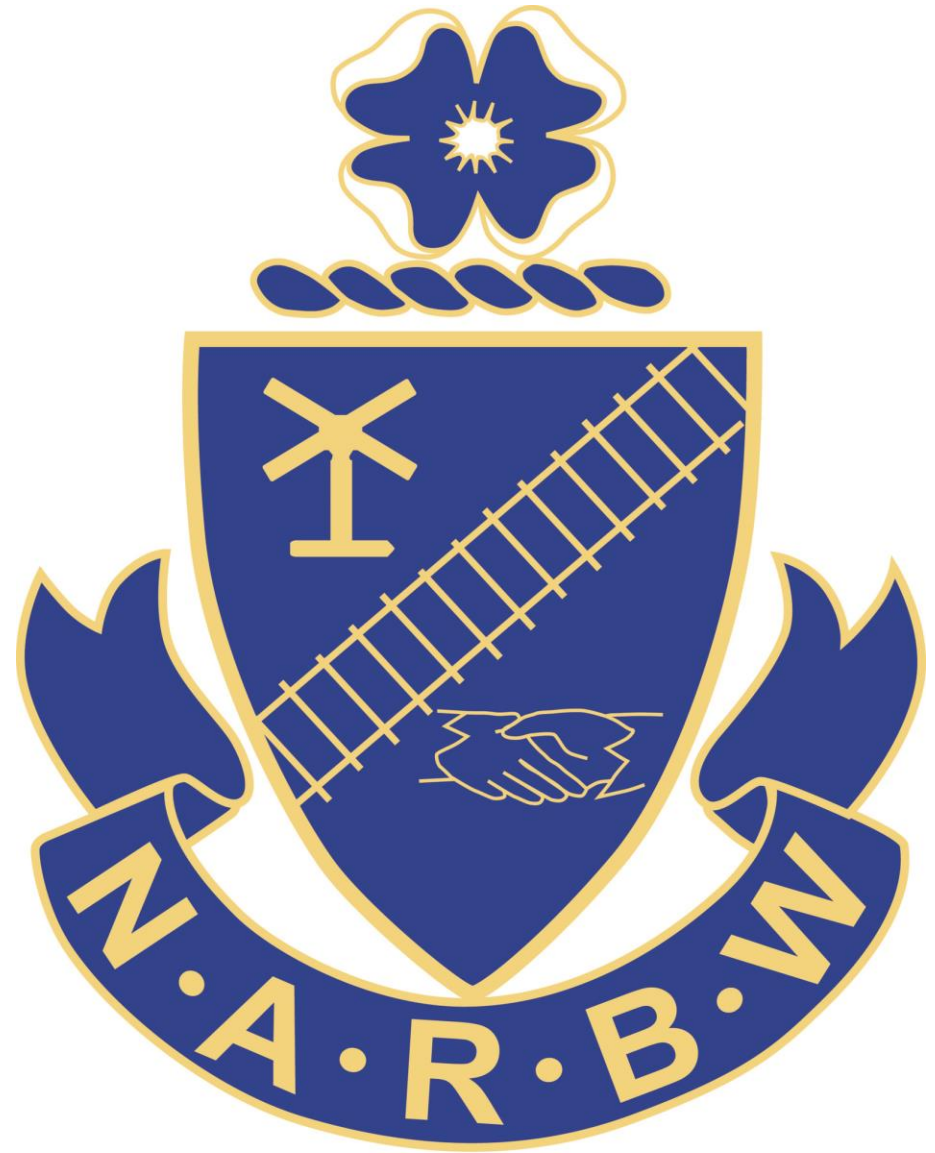

Amtrak came into her life in 1975 when she was the first new hire at the Amtrak Beech Grove Facility. Working for the railroad was not her ideal career path, however she says, “It has been rewarding in so many ways!” For 2019, joining the Houston Chapter of NARBW has not only allowed Bridget to utilize her gifts and talents as publication chair, but has also provided opportunity for The Houston NARBW Chapter to grow and reach other women in the railroad community. Bridget says, “It has been a true blessing to be associated with a group of ladies who are so passionately involved and dedicated to the Houston Community. I pray that I can provide the same inspiration and mentorship to other young women who work in or aspire to work in the railroad industry.”

Bridget graduated from Lindsey Wilson College where she was a collegiate soccer player. She had many honors including; Player of The Year, All District and All Region Teams, NAIA Senior Bowl East Team. During college, she served as a Head Resident Assistant, Treasurer of the United Rainbow Coalition Club and President of the Health and Fitness Club on her campus. Her final year of college Bridget was a Student Assistant Coach to the Woman’s Soccer Team, where she recruited and mentored many female athletes.

Bridget’s degree is in Human Services. Her aspirations were to be a Marriage and Family Counselor until her brother Sean (UP Train Dispatcher), had told her about an opportunity at Union Pacific for position as a Train Dispatcher. Bridget put her Marriage and Family counseling career plans on hold for the adventure and challenge of dispatching trains. This was the beginning of so many opportunities. Bridget dispatched trains for 5 years and she remembers, “I couldn’t have done it without the support and mentorship of the many talented women in the industry who helped me along in my career.” At Union Pacific, Bridget has not only been a dispatcher, but was a Manager of Manpower Planning, and is now a Safety and Rules Manager for Train Dispatchers in the Spring Dispatching Center. Bridget has participated as a member of LEAD (the woman initiative organization at Union Pacific) and her innovative thinking caught the attention of the leadership at UP where she lead a UPWAY continuous improvement project which changed the way Union Pacific managed training for all Train Dispatchers. She has spoken as guest speaker representing the Dispatch Center at UP’s Engineering Conferences and thrives where she can be innovative, making changes that enhance the workplace. Her greatest accomplishment was leading a team with ideas that transformed the Annual Dispatcher Training at Union Pacific from a 8 hour class of text and rules, to an interactive class that integrated the rules in with topics such as Emotional Intelligence, Risk Perception and the human factor behind dispatcher incidents. Bridget says, “The class was a huge project. She came up with the idea as the current rules review class did not talk about the “why” behind incidents. Part of her duties as a Rules Manager were to investigate Train Dispatcher incidents which almost all the rule incidents did not occur because the Dispatcher didn’t know the rules, but because of some type of distraction. We need to help bring awareness to more than just “how” to follow the rules, but having overall situational awareness, which also includes “how or what” a person is feeling, etc. We must be in touch with the whole person. What truly touched my heart with our training initiative was the countless number of employees who told me that the training impacted their everyday life outside of work, which is huge.”

Bridget is a member of Altrusa International of Montgomery County where she has volunteered at the Montgomery County Library and Willis Nursing home. Bridget served as a member of the Family Ministries Committee at her church, volunteered as a guest speaker at the annual PINK Defying

Philadelphia – Maryann Pettit

She has participated in dozens of fundraisers and events and has been a constant supporter of the Philadelphia Chapter's charitable efforts. During a campaign for hats for underprivileged children who were being provided a train ride at Christmas, Maryann knitted several dozen hats to be donated. At one time Maryann performed the duties of secretary to the chapter. She has been a faithful attendee at chapter monthly meetings and charitable and entertainment events. Maryann has held meetings in her home and provided a beautiful retirement dinner/meeting for a retiring chapter member.

Maryann started her railroad career with the Pennsylvania in the later 1950's. 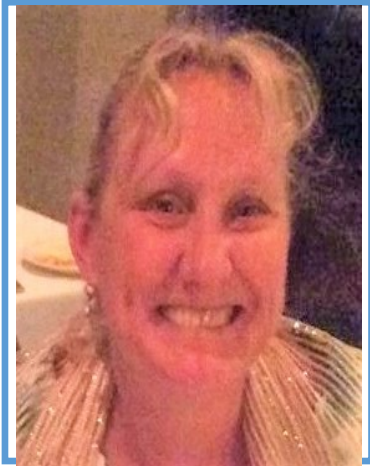

Omaha Chapter Kay Leslie



Kay began her career with Union Pacific Railroad in March 1971 in the Accounting Department at UP Headquarters in Omaha, Nebraska. She worked various jobs before being promoted to management in the Finance Department. While still working, she went to night school to complete a degree in Business. In August 1988, Kay transferred to the St Louis, Missouri office, where she worked as a Project Manager in Quality Control. The position allowed her to interact with personnel at all levels and in numerous departments to ensure that billing accuracy, timeliness, and cash flow issues were adequately addressed. Kay developed a system that monitored daily, rather than monthly, billing accuracy of shipments, thus allowing Marketing and Finance personnel to adequately address issues affecting cash flow.

Kay left the railroad after twenty years to return to college and pursue her dream to study horticulture. After establishing her own landscaping company, Leslie Landscape, she branched out to manage an established Nursery & Landscape company in southern Missouri. But friends and family beckoned her to return to her roots back home in Iowa and Nebraska. She returned to Union Pacific Railroad in Omaha in 1997, where she held various management positions before retiring in 2010, with thirty-three years of service.

With help from the membership, the ten years of golf tournaments have allowed the chapter to raise thousands of dollars, thus enabling them to give back to the community. Kay currently also serves as Nominating Chair.

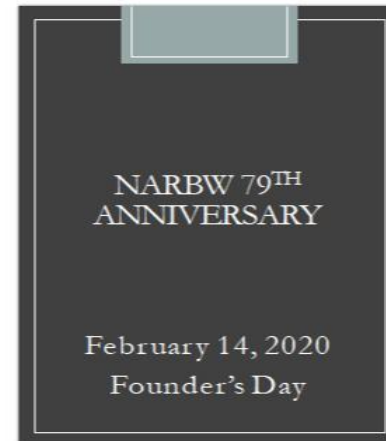

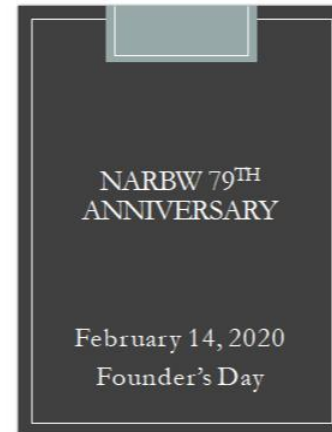

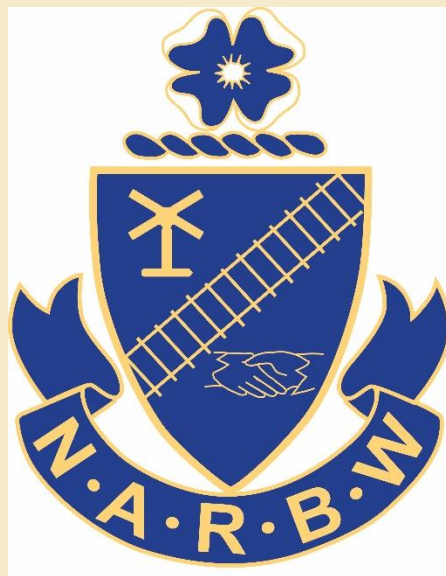
